This half-day event, the launch symposium for UCSD's new Program in Transnational Korean Studies (http://koreanstudies.ucsd.edu/), brings to campus three prominent scholars who are experts in the study of what has typically been called the "Cold War." However, rather than using the euphemistic term "cold" to denote an extended period of peace that was experienced in many parts of the West, this symposium will focus on the forms of violence, dislocation, and trauma created by the Korean War and ongoing hostilities on the peninsula, a situation we denote by the term "hot wars." We are especially interested in explaining this phenomenon through the lens of culture since the violence that resulted from the rivalries of the First and Second World Wars resulted in irreparable transformations in body politics, kinship patterns, and community relations.
